INTRODUCTION

Welcome to our tenth Newsletter. It should reach the majority of you by mid-December so we take the opportunity to wish all members a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. Since it is close to the end of the year we are in a relatively quiescent period so news is rather sparse for this letter. However, there is a bit on one of the other Apprentice Associations, we have a couple of anecdotes from Brian Armitage and the likely date of next year's reunion and AGM.

MEETING OF APPRENTICES' ASSOCIATIONS

In the last Newsletter we reported on the combined meeting of Apprentice Associations at Halton in August. Freddy Joyce, the Chairman of the Ex-Ruislip Apprentice Clerks (1925-42) has written a letter to all the associations and you will be interested to hear what he says.

He writes that they are a very small association with the main aims of holding a social reunion and contacting their missing men ie. those who did not go on to pension and retirement from the Service. Those that did have already been tracked down. They have located 500 with a further 800 known to be deceased. The remainder, some 2080, are so far untraced. Around 200 are in contact and of these some 100 to 150 attend reunions.

The Association does not have a formal structure, there is no committee nor a membership fee and any costs accruing are added to the cost of the reunion. Also, Freddy has undertaken the task of recreating the nominal rolls of the 61 entries who served as admin apprentices or apprentice clerks as they were then called and had serial numbers from 590001 to 592080. He records that there was some occasional cross fertilisation between the other apprentice schools so an ex-Halton or ex-Cranwell apprentice does turn up with a 59 number!

He goes on to write that the Ruislip Apprentices are now a reducing entity. Even the most junior entry members are now all past their 70th birthday.

He thinks that the inclusion of the Boy Entrants Association next year would be much appreciated by them especially those of pre-war vintage. Recruiting pamphlets of their period shows very clearly that the trades of wireless op, Armourer and photographer were specifically intended to fill the non-pilot/navigator positions on the multi-seat aircraft and their casualties in the early part of the war bears this out. And as he points out the main link for all of us is the 'wheel.'

MEMBERSHIP NOTES

Members will be pleased to hear that despite some dropouts we have a data base of 368 members. Had we not had a batch of non-renewals we would be well over our aimed for 400 membership and it is as well now to ask you all to go through the old diaries of telephone numbers to see if we can get a few more to join us. Because, as we keep on saying, new member applications depend to a large extent on you spreading the word through the personal network. And to make things simple, we enclose, as usual, a membership application which we would ask you to pass on to old mates. With Christmas approaching, now is a good time to see if they are still on the same telephone number that you last rang 20 years ago. So go to it with those honed powers of persuasion.

We still get an occasional question of why no ranks on the data base and why do we not publish addresses. Well, the reasons for not providing members' addresses are still valid and we will continue to maintain the policy for the time being. The grounds are worth going over again for new members who will no doubt be interested.

They are 3 fold. Firstly, if we publish our database information we have to register the Association under the Data Protection Act at a quite large initial

cost. Secondly, some members may wish their addresses to remain private and this desire must be given due regard. And lastly, despite a brighter future, security considerations still apply. With many members still serving it is considered to be better not to include members' ranks on the database. However, we will be reviewing this policy on a regular basis. So, if any member wishes to contact another and does not have his address, we will happily act as a postbox and pass on any communication. Unfortunately we are unable to include a full update of the membership with this issue - there are still a few names unpublished and we hope that the new members concerned will forgive us.

We again include our standing order proforma to make subscription payment less painful and will continue to include it in all future Newsletters. Please remember that the current subscription for renewal is £7-50 and will remain at this level until at least next June when it will again be set at the AGM. Also, it is essential that when you complete it you send it back to the Treasurer so that he will know that your subscription is to be paid by the bank. He will take the necessary action to inform your branch manager of your instruction.

COMMITTEE CHANGES

We reported in the last Newsletter that the term of office for committee members was 3 years as set down in the Constitution. At the AGM in June next year, 9 of the current committee will stand down to be either replaced or to stand for re-election. Currently, it is uncertain who of the current committee will stand again; however, it is known that the Secretary, the Treasurer and the Membership Secretary having carried out a fairly time consuming task over the past 3 years wish to be relieved of their posts.

All 3 jobs need access to a pc and the requisite skills to manage the necessary functions and software. Both the Treasurer and the Membership Secretary are using their own fairly sophisticated software so the Association may have to purchase some packages for whoever takes over the tasks. For the Secretary's job we need a hack to regurgitate the Newsletter. However, the main requisite here is to own a large wet tongue to seal the envelopes and stick on the stamps. On occasions, it is also necessary to be able to record what is decided at meetings.

Although the tasks take up time, they are not that

onerous and do give satisfaction to the post holder. So please drop the Secretary a line if you are interested in undertaking the duties of any one of these 3 posts and we will give you a full brief of what the jobs entail.

FLOWERDOWN FAIR (FF96) AND THE LAA AGM

It has now been decided that next year's Flowerdown Fair will be the last to be held at RAF Locking and in consequence it will be a rather special one. TWO SHORT TALES

Last year we had to report on the sad death of Brian Carpenter. Since then, Brian Armitage (71st Entry), has dug into the memory and writes, 'I met Brian and his fiancée, Christine, at RAF Waddington in 1958 but we lost contact in 1961 and by the time I had relocated him he had died. We were very good friends and I raised a glass of his favourite drink to his memory. I'm sure he would have appreciated the toast.'

'One Wednesday in mid-winter, Brian and I decided to sample the delights of Cleethorpes. The crazy golf was shut and the illuminated map in the bus depot was broken so we entered a large hotel in search of a bar. Sure enough a huge mahogany creation with an awesome display of whisky dominated a large room full of dark tables and chairs, all empty. An imposing dinner jacketed barman treated us, his only customers, with elaborate respect. We eyed the whisky. "George IV please....a small one," I said. "Certainly sir. Would you like ice?" I declined. At the age of 23 I was a world expert in whisky. He measured the minuscule whisky into a large glass and served it with a flourish. "..... and you Sir?" he said turning to my friend.

Brian was also a world expert. "Have you got Grant's Standfast, he asked." The waiter surveyed the expanse of bottles with care. "No-o-o-o," he said, finally, "... but there might be some in the cellar. Would you like me to look?" Brian would so the waiter excused himself and disappeared down a trap door at the back of the bar. He was gone for ages but finally reappeared triumphantly brandishing a bottle of Grants. "A small one Sir?" he asked, diplomatically. Brian considered for a moment. "Yes, I think so-o-o....." he said, his reply fading away to nothing. The waiter busied himself with the little silver measuring cup and after decanting the contents into a glass turned to deliver it to my companion. With consummate timing Brian finished his sentence, ".....and will you put orange in it?"

I waited for him outside.

Brian also writes about parades in the early 50s especially church parades.

'In April 1952,' he writes, 'an induction officer at RAF Locking was recording my particulars. "Religion?" he enquired, pen poised. "Atheist," I said, preparing for the inevitable discussion on my disbelief and a doomed attempt to convert me to Christianity. Up to that moment the RAF had been pure benevolence and reason but now I had taken the King's shilling and I had a lot to learn. "C of E," he announced as he completed the entry. I was too stunned to argue and did not know what C of E meant anyway!'

On Sunday mornings we C of Es were paraded, inspected and marched off to a hangar for a cold, droughty and impersonal service. The whole experience was thoroughly unpleasant and for some time Sunday morning was the low point of the week; however,

research into my past revealed that I had been christened as a Congregationalist. This was wonderful news. Congregationalist I had learnt was an 'other denomination' (OD) and the ODs were truly envied. When most of the lads were marching off to the hangar each Sunday, the ODs and sods attended a small warm chapel near the sports field which served coffee and biscuits in the lounge after a short service. This was unheard of luxury, the coffee was made with milk and was free of bromide. It was probably the only hot drink that was!

The RAF treated my request to change my religion with a suspicion only matched in later years by US emigration officials but armed with that most potent of weapons, a letter from Mum, I finally managed to get my records changed and I joined the ranks of the ODs. An atheist I remain, but the humanity of that little chapel taught me all the good things about Christianity and influenced my social behaviour for life. The coffee and biscuits helped and I had also

learnt that the best way to avoid parades was not necessarily to report sick.

Two years later, a special weekend parade was announced. Everyone had to attend, AAs and real airmen alike. All leave was cancelled and no 36 or 48 hour passes were to be issued. Since apprentices never saw those anyway this did not mean much but nobody was going to escape this one....By Order.

On the Thursday before we were destined to enjoy this parade, a telegram addressed to me was opened in the squadron office. It contained the sad news that my Grandfather was not expected to live beyond the weekend. I was summoned from mid-class and ordered to double to the squadron office where the news was broken to me in a surprisingly gentle manner. I was given a four day pass and a railway warrant to Manchester. Within an hour I was on my way home.

Sadly Grandfather died.....in 1917.
