WELCOME

Welcome to this the first News Letter of the Association. Our intention is to produce it quarterly after each Committee Meeting to let you know what we are doing on your behalf and to keep you in touch with what other members are thinking.

Enclosed with this News Letter you will find a copy of the Constitution together with a number of proforma. More information on these will be found below. For those members who did not join the Association at the AGM, you will find a letter of welcome from the Chairman plus your gilt Apprentice wheel.

But, firstly, here is a message from Joe Holroyd:

THE CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

"There were times (though not too many) in the past when I doubted that I would have the pleasure of writing to you through the medium of a RAF Locking Apprentices Association publication. To say that I am happy to do so is the understatement of the year!! I will not waste space and paper by wittering on. However, I must say, 'Thank you' to all of you, those who gave me support in the early days, offered advice on how to generate a response to the original call for members, sent cash as well as an sae, spread the word themselves and most importantly turned up at the inaugural meeting and the celebrations before and after it. In addition, we all owe thanks to the staff at RAF Locking for organizing the venue for our meeting - I have written to the Station Commander accordingly. Since the 19 June reunion and inaugural meeting there has been an encouraging number of enquiries concerning membership which have been passed on to Neil Castle our Membership Sec, I trust all of you are trawling for new members as well!!"

"We have now laid the foundations of our

association, your committee and I will be counting on your support to ensure it flourishes and grows, please be involved we would welcome your ideas and comment on how you feel we should operate."

"I have only one other point to make and that concerns our ladies/wives/partners. I do feel we should, whenever possible, encourage our partners and families to come to our gatherings in the future - time especially at the weekends is precious to us all. This topic is open for discussion through the Newsletter, I await your response."

FORMATION OF THE ASSOCIATION

The Inaugural General Meeting of the Association, held on the 19 June, 1993 did not quite go as planned. Joe Holroyd, having mislaid his prepared brief had to fall back on an unprepared Secretary. Nevertheless, the formation of the Association was achieved with the business of the day being got through in remarkably short time.

For those not present, the main business of the Meeting was to accept a draft Constitution, to form a Committee to implement it and to agree a joining fee to meet the expenses of the Association in pursuance of the objectives.

Joe, our Chairman, in outlining the draft Constitution to the Meeting, said that it was modelled on the Cranwell Apprentice Association's Constitution which has been tried and tested over the past 8 years. There are in fact a few differences; the name has been suitably changed and the text has been put into SE or simplified English so that the Secretary can understand it. It is worth a read and will occupy only few minutes of your time. Any thoughts you might have on its content are of interest to us so don't keep it to yourself. Call the Secretary or discuss it with your Apprentice Representative. In that way, changes can be brought about at future Annual General

Meetings.

Joe outlined the duties that needed to be performed in running the Association and introduced members of an ad hoc volunteer Committee who he recommended for approval. All had been involved in the run up to the Inaugural Meeting but an additional number were still required to be representatives for each of the apprentice groups. Altogether, the Committee voted into office by the Meeting consists of ten members under Joe's leadership. A list of this body with contact addresses and numbers is included in a later section.

On the question of finances for the Association, Joe again used the Cranwell Association annual fee as a guide. He outlined the sort of expenses that would have to be met but he also listed the benefits to members. After general discussion the Meeting voted to set the initial joining fee at £10-00 with subsequent annual subscriptions set at £8-50 or as set by future AGMs on recommendations by the Committee. As part of the initial fee it was decided that each member on joining would receive a miniature apprentice wheel, a name badge and a quarterly news letter.

Immediately after the Meeting the Membership Secretary, assisted by other Committee Members, opened the joining shop and signed up a total of 114 members. A further 90 have indicated their interest and Neil Castle is in the business of writing to them with invitations to join. We are also asking you to help by passing on the enclosed membership proforma to friends who may not have heard about the Association. All new members are very welcome and we are aiming to have a continually growing client list recruited through the membership network. Currently, we are aiming at a membership of 250 by next year's AGM.

OUR FIRST REUNION

The Reunion that took place before and after the Meeting was coupled with an exhibition of photographs and memorabilia. So as well as a meeting of old friends, it was an opportunity to be reminded of times past. It was also a chance for the Committee to highlight the dismal state and lack of care of the few bits and pieces that record the presence of Apprentices at Locking. Many of the photographs that remain are

unidentified and have been used piecemeal by the History of Radar Museum for exhibits causing damage and in some cases complete loss. Many other articles and documents have been destroyed over the years and it now seems likely that some of the earlier Entry Shields will never be recovered.

Sadly, official apprentice memorabilia has never been maintained nor has it ever been anyone's responsibility until now. Neil Castle is taking the lead in this enterprise and, with your help, he believes that we can regain some of that which has been destroyed. He would be particularly grateful for donations of artifacts, documents and photographs or any other evidence of your life during Apprentice service at RAF Locking. Ultimately, the intention is to produce a comprehensive historical record of the Apprentice Wing at Locking from inception to disbandment. It is also intended to provide articles in future News Letters about personalities who served over the years either as Apprentices or staff at No 1 Radio School and the Secretary would be delighted to hear from anyone with suitable material.

Those who attended the Reunion may recall that the SWO, WO Ian Norris was doing a fair trade selling first day covers. He was also inducing members to buy raffle tickets for a framed display of covers. One of the earlier purchasers of these tickets was a winner. The bad news was that he did not stay around long enough to learn of his good fortune. If anyone still has ticket No 31, please get in touch with the Secretary.

YOUR COMMITTEE

A list of Committee Members with contact addresses are published at the end of the News Letter; do use them. They will be delighted if you contact them. Currently 6 are still serving and of these, 3 are stationed conveniently at Locking. Of the rest, Joe Holroyd expects to remain at Brampton so is centrally placed, John Leaper is currently at Brize Norton - on TCW, naturally - and Doug Cornford is at RAF Newton.

THE ASSOCIATION'S TIE

Neil Castle has been working hard to have our Association Tie produced in reasonable time. The design was chosen the responses from received from those of you who attended the Reunion. The largest vote was for the one illustrated here which was not actually on display. Many of you liked the initial design but questioned the need for the No 1 RS text. So this we have left off. We believe that the design matches the Association's mood of pride in service avoiding whilst the traditional military stripes favoured by many Service organisations.

Committee decided that we should provide a



The hundred-plus members enlisting at the Reunion have already been joined by others and the list grows each week. However, our aim is steady growth and various ways have been discussed of how we might achieve this aim. Our experience so far with advertising suggests that it is not cost effective and the numbers we already have are almost all due to someone, knowing someone. network is therefore the way ahead and we are banking on you all to get in touch with old friends to spread the word about the Association. An application form is enclosed and it is suggested that you pass it on to a friend together with this News Letter. Alternatively, get them to telephone the Secretary. As a back up, we

shall be making an entry on Channel 4 Teletext and other media outlets are being looked into but you, the members, will be the main source of increasing our numbers.

It was heartening to note that at the Inaugural Meeting there were few entries not represented by at least one member. Generally, the exceptions were those entries already having their own strong associations and, to these organisations, we send fraternal greetings.



APPRENTICE ENTRY CHANGES

Many of the more mature members who attended the Reunion were unaware that different types of apprentice entry had been introduced over time and it is worth a line or two to outline these changes and explain why the modifications were necessary.

The first change occurred as a result of the 1964 Trade Structure which was introduced to meet the growing complexity of RAF aircraft and electronic systems. In particular, the impending arrival of the TSR2 showed that the reliance on maintenance by repair had to end. superseded by the concept of repair by replacement and all engineering trades were affected by this policy. As a result the single skill Aircraft Apprentice was replaced by the Technician Apprentice whose 3 year training covered the whole spectrum of the trade. Graduating in the rank of Cpl, he passed out with an ONC which gave him a considerable advantage over former Locking Aircraft Apprentices.

Also as part of the 1964 Trade Structure, Craft Apprenticeships were introduced to meet the Service's need for skilled craftsmen. were introduced in the previous single skilled trades with a reduced course length of 2 years. Whilst the Technician Apprentices carried on with the Aircraft Apprentice entry numbers, the new craft Apprentices started a new series from 201. Finally, and again driven more by the needs of the aircraft engineering trades than by those of the communications and electronics trade group, a few entries of Mechanic Apprentices were introduced with entry numbers in the 400 series. Their training commenced in 1970 but lasted for only five entries.

For the record, the final Aircraft Apprentice entry was the 106; they passed out in 1966 as did the first two craft Apprentice entries. The first Technician Apprentice entry was the 107 passing out in 1967. Mechanic Apprentice entries, the first of which was the 402,

completed a one year course. The final one, the 406, passed out in 1972. The final Locking Craft Apprentice entry was the 231st and the final Technician Apprentice entry was the 122nd passing out respectively in 1974 and

1976. There is still a final Technician Apprentice entry to pass out from Cosford, the Unit to which avionic apprentice training was transferred from Locking in 1965. They leave on the 7th of October this year just short of 73 years after the first batch of Apprentices began their 3 year training at Cranwell.

NEXT YEAR'S ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Already, we are making plans for the next AGM. It will be held at RAF Locking subject to the approval of the Station Commander and its provisional date is the 18 June 1994 when it is expected that the Unit will hold an open day. This event is unlikely to be a Flowerdown Fair, the future of which is in the balance as overheads become prohibitive and low numbers of students impose too great a load on Statiresources. We intend to make it a weekeng entertainment with planned functions centred around the Reunion and AGM on the Saturday Morning. Suggested events are a dinner dance on the Friday evening and possibly a show on the Saturday evening in either Weston or It has also been suggested that the Bristol. ladies might appreciate a trip to say Wells on the Saturday morning whilst we are holding the AGM. If you have ideas on what you would like to see in the programme, why not give your Rep a call?

THE PROPOSED OCTOBER DINNER DANCE

Also planned is the next Dinner Dance to held, as before, at Party and Dancescene in Weston-Super-Mare. This initial low cost event was generally enjoyed by all who attended and many members have asked that we run a similar one in the Autumn. This has now been arranged; it is to take place on Saturday 23 October 1993. Enclosed are details with the cost. If you would like to attend, please send your application with cheque attached to the address indicated.

FUTURE SOCIAL FUNCTIONS

We would very much like to hear your views on what you would like to see put on over the year. Obviously, a function's viability depends on the numbers attending; moreover, attendance is governed by cost and as we all know, times are hard! However, weekends at Weston provide a pleasant break at affordable terms and, if there are sufficient numbers, discounts and special offers are available at some of the better hotels. THE 70th ANNIVERSARY COMMEMORATIVE PLATE

A few members have asked about the 70th Anniversary Commemorative Plate which was conceived by Sqn Ldr David Taylor RAF(Retd) ex 56th entry Cranwell. The Plate commemorates 70 years of Apprentice training which was celebrated on the 18th of July 1992 at an Open Air Thanksgiving Service on the Embankment Gardens outside the Ministry of Defence Main Building. Over 500 ex-Apprentices attended the event and marched past the Statue of Lord Trenchard, MRAF Sir Keith Williamson (50th entry Cranwell) took the salute and also present was Air Mshl Sir Eric Dunn (48th Entry Cranwell) who is the Life president of the Cranwell Apprentice Association. Sales of the plate met the expenses of the Thanksgiving Service and the rest of the profit will go toward a permanent Apprentice Stand at the RAF Museum. Any residue will benefit the Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund.

The Plate itself is of fine china and bears the crests of the No 1 School of Technical Training and No 1 Radio School separated by a figure of an apprentice in 1930s uniform. At the top and bottom is respectively the RAF cap badge and the apprentice wheel. The plate is signed on the

reverse side by Air Chf Mshl Sir Michael Armitage, Patron of the Halton Apprentice Association and Air Mshl Sir Eric Dunn. Each plate is serial numbered and 1000 were produced. David Taylor still has a few left so if there are any members desirous of purchasing one of these attractive souvenirs - they retail at £25 - please ring the Secretary.

FEEDBACK

As already outlined, the Association, being an embryo organisation, is dedicated to serving its members. It came into being because that is what you wanted. Having now been formed it must develop and move on from mere existence to being a corporate amenity of use to its members. Let us know how it can better serve you and go on to further its objectives.
