First of all I would like to thank all of you who attended the AGM on the 18th of June and supported the social functions before and after, which made the whole weekend a worthwhile occasion. It was good to see so many new members and very gratifying to see that our membership has nearly tripled in only 12 months. AGM AND REUNION

On a pleasant Saturday morning on the 18 June the Association held its first Annual General Meeting when around 120 members, many accompanied by their wives, enjoyed a short reunion with a morning of meeting and greeting before the AGM took place.

The Flowerdown Brass, RAF Locking's voluntary band, provided background music and members were able to see the entry shields in their new position on the Station Theatre wall. This year we were also able to run our own subsidised bar with 1970 prices. Neil Castle and John Hall produced some splendid displays and of major note, members were able to meet our new President, Air Commodore Martin Palmer.

Memorabilia on display included the video which members can purchase for £6-00 plus postage and packing. A proforma is included for those members wishing to order one. Also on view were several items of miniatures such as Apprentice wheel cuff links, tie tack, sparks badges, full size wheels and ladies left-pointing eagle brooches. All these items, which are available through the Secretary, are manufactured in silver and gilt. Also on sale were prints of the painting 'Beaufort Over Locking.' Details of the meeting are outlined below.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

The President told the Meeting that he was pleased and honoured to be invited to become the Association's President. The organisation was, he said, helping to keep alive the spirit of the Apprentice scheme which first saw wireless and electrical apprentices at Flowerdown in 1922. After a move to Cranwell in 1929 the school made its final home at Locking in 1952. He noted that, with the last entry passing out in 1976, the periods of time the School spent at Cranwell and Locking were almost equal in length. He went on to tell the Meeting that the Apprentice scheme had had to fight constantly to stay alive and the spirit this generated was very much in evidence in the old recovered film that had recently been made into a video.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The Chairman thanked Air Cdre Martin Palmer for accepting the Presidency of the Association and also thanked the Station Commander for agreeing to become the Honorary Vice President. He also welcomed Vic Ludlow (68th) who is the Secretary of the RAFCAA as well as being a member of the RAFLAA, confirmation, he said, of the close links between the 2 Associations. In his review of the year he reported that the Association had met its main Constitutional objectives; it had achieved a steady growth, had provided the membership with 2 social events and, most importantly, was about to propose

a means of recognising Apprentice training at Locking.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The Treasurer, in his report, pointed out that the balance sheet reflected the position of the Association at the end of its financial year on 31 Dec 93. Since that time many transactions had taken place with funds flowing in and out of the account. The net effect was that the Association's finances were still in good order with nearly £1000 on deposit with no large bills outstanding. He went on to point out that much of the expenditure was up-front money and that stocks acquired were gradually turned back into cash. Timing was therefore an important element in the accounting. Of particular note was the very small sum on the Balance Sheet for printing. Virtually all the Association's reproduction work was carried out free of charge; however, there was no guarantee that this state of affairs would last for ever but in the short term he said that he was confident that this item would not become a burden on the Association.

MEMBERSHIP SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Membership Secretary said that the membership stood at 297 and he expected it to reach 300 by the end of the moming. He reviewed the efforts that had been made to reach potential new members through advertising and local radio but pointed out that the best route was still through the members themselves. He said that a few had, by their own efforts, traced almost the whole of their own particular entries and had shown what was possible with a little determination. He also made a plea for memorabiliar if members wished to donate it and outlined the facilities that he had now acquired to safeguard photographs and other items.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

The Chairman proposed the following changes to the Constitution:

Administrative Change. It was proposed to amend the Constitution in order to allow the Committee to go outside the Membership for the annual audit. The amendment deletes, 'from the Association Membership' from paragraph 13.

<u>Life Membership.</u> It was proposed that paragraph 5 of the Constitution (Finance) be extended to admit life membership. The change adds, 'Life membership of the Association may be purchased for a single payment of £100.'

Associate Membership. It was proposed that paragraph 9 of the Constitution (Membership) be extended to include Associate Membership. The new addition would read: 'Additionally, Associate Membership may be offered in selected cases to individuals who had a close association with the training of Apprentices at RAF Locking or who made a significant contribution to the training.'

Appointment of Vice President.

It was proposed that the Commandant of No 1 Radio School should be elected as the Association's Vice President. The amendment to paragraph 10 of the Constitution to read: `b. The Commandant of No 1 Radio School as Honorary Vice President.'

After discussion, all the proposals were passed by the Meeting but the one relating to Associate Membership gave rise to the greatest debate. Disquiet was expressed by some over the ramifications of allowing Associate Membership; however, the Committee were of the view that since the privilege would be sparingly, probably rarely, used and that as the appointment would have to be ratified by the AGM, there was a sufficient safeguard to satisfy most objections. Moreover, it was also felt that the Association would benefit from those invited to become Associates.

On this matter, Members who wish to nominate a candidate for Associate Membership should note the stringent qualification required and that a resume off the nominee's career would be required before the Committee could consider the application.

Members should note that it is not intended to reissue a new Constitution. We recommend that Members record the changes as handwritten amendments to their copies.

SUBSCRIPTIONS

The Chairman outlined the required financial need in 94/95 and the Meeting agreed that the annual renewal membership fee was to be £7-50. The joining fee would remain at £10. Members will be invoiced for their subscriptions during the month that they first joined the Association.

MEMBERS PROPOSITIONS

The Chairman outlined a Committee proposal to present an annual award to No 1 Radio School. This award would meet the dual Constitutional objectives of commemorating the training of Apprentices at RAF Locking and at the same time would recognise achievement in training and technical merit.

The proposal was to present a trophy to No 1 Radio School to the value of £250; it would be in the Commandant's gift to award it annually for outstanding performance. In addition, a further £50 a year was proposed to provide the recipient with a miniature.

Whilst the proposal met universal acceptance in principle there was much discussion on the detail and it was finally left to the Committee to determine the extent and scope of the award within the approved expenditure.

CHANGE OF COMMITTEE MEMBER

The Chairman announced that Committee Member Dave Rees was leaving shortly for a tour in Cyprus and called for a replacement nomination. Peter Crowe, 95th entry, volunteered to take on the post and his election was agreed by the Meeting.

NEXT AGM

Finally, the Chairman said that the Meeting should decide a provisional date for the next AGM and said that it would be held at RAF Locking on 17 June 1995 which is the most likely Saturday for next year's Flowerdown Fair.

MEMBERSHIP NOTES

Members will be pleased to know that we are now more than 300 in number and that we have our first member in New Zealand. We were looking at a target of 250 in the first year and having surpassed it by a margin undreamt of in June 93 we are now looking at a new one of 400 by next year's AGM. However, new members applications depend to a large extent on you spreading the word through friends that you have kept in contact with so, as usual, we are enclosing a membership application which we would ask you to pass on after using your persuasive powers.

Because of the steady increase in members it is now becoming more difficult to print a complete list of the membership at each Newsletter so we have decided to print it out once a year and issue supplementary sheets each quarter. For new members, they will receive the current list on joining.

The reasons for not providing members' addresses are still valid and we will continue to maintain the policy. The grounds are worth reiterating and new members will no doubt be interested. They are 3 fold. Firstly, if we publish our database information we have to register the Association under the Data Protection Act at a large initial cost. Secondly, some members may wish their addresses to remain private and this desire must be given due regard. Finally, security, especially for those members still serving, is now an essential consideration. It is also for this last reason that we have decided not to include members' ranks on the database.

You will find the list of members at the back of the News Letter printed in order of entries. Should any member wish to contact other members, we will be pleased to act as a post box and pass on any communication.

SAD DEATH OF BRIAN CARPENTER

It is with great sadness that we report the death of Brian Carpenter of the 75th entry, a member of the Association. Brian, who was 57 years old, died of a heart attack on Monday 4 July. Although under treatment for a heart condition, his passing was unexpected. Brian was a great sailor with his own offshore boat and a staunch member of the Portchester Sailing Club many of whose members attended the

Funeral which was held on 12 July at Portchester Crematorium. The Association was represented by Brian Johnson (76th) and Terry Kendall (76th) also attended. Before retiring, Brian worked for Marconi Communications in Portsmouth. We offer our sincere condolences to Christine, his widow, and his 2 Sons.

Although not a members of the Association we also sadly record the deaths of 3 other ex-apprentices in June. The first of these was Paul Youhill (84th) who died tragically in a glider accident on the Mendips. Paul was an electronic design engineer who was responsible for elements of the Space Shuttle. He worked on the programme at both Houston and Cape Canaveral. In a car accident in France, Derek Parker (68th) was killed along with his wife Jan as they motored back to catch the ferry home at the end of their summer holiday. Derek spent some 25 years as an instrumentation manager at Hinkley Point Nuclear Power Station. Finally, the death of Geoff Venton (104th) has been reported by Mike Strange of the same entry. Geoff died of cancer after a long period of suffering on the 21 June. We offer our sincere condolences to the bereaved families.

Our priority as always is to keep the production cost of these sheets to the absolute minimum; however, it is also the intention to make it interesting and more presentable with members participating. So we would very much like to hear from you.

THREAT TO AXE RAF LOCKING

In a previous News Letter we outlined the moves that were taking place in the Service that would ultimately affect RAF Locking. The RAF Ground Training Review took place 2 years ago and the results of this study were announced in Parliament in November 1992. In essence, the Government accepted the recommendations to centre all RAF Engineering Training at RAF Cosford whilst concentrating Administrative Training at RAF Halton. However, RAF Locking was to continue as the Base for TG3 and TG11 training subject to further review.

The "further review" took place very rapidly and it was considered by some that an announcement would be made about closure at the beginning of this year. Councillor Peter Bryant (89th), who was Weston's Town Mayor at the time raised a Government petition obtaining the support of 16500 of Weston's population and presented the signatures to Viscount Cranbourne at the Ministry of Defence on 15 March this year.

Much local press speculation suggested that RAF Locking's closure would be announced by Defence

Secretary, Malcolm Rifkind, in his July statement to Parliament; however, the Station did not receive a mention. If the aim of the MOD is to raise uncertainty to a maximum then they have done a good job for we now hear that there will be, sorry might be, an announcement on Locking's future in the Autumn or perhaps at the beginning of next year.

FOR THE LADIES

AND FINALLY - DOWN ON THE FARM

Do you remember the Station Pig Farm? That heap of mud and ordure by the rifle range. The area of interesting aromas and squealing pink piglets; of bins of swill on the rattling trailer, of cock up management and overfried barely eatable bacon served up for breakfast. Well, all was not what it seemed. Here is an extract from the Locking Review of 1955 exactly as it appeared and lovingly written by then O IC.

"Chief events of interest are on the Pig Farm, where initial measures have been taken to cope with the changed conditions in the Pig Industry."

"Various causes have resulted in the necessity for a much higher standard in quality production, and to keep abreast of competition in this direction the Station Farm has acquired seven pedigree Wessex Saddlebacks Sows and also has its own pedigree stock boar of the same breed. The points essential for the production of high quality bacon and pork have already been fixed in these breeding sows, but it is intended to develop and improve these points in our own breeding."

"The breeding sows of the herd have all reared their first litters and three of them have now farrowed for the second time. The sire of these second litters is our own stock boar 'Chancellor's Wonder 4th.' The first examples of his progeny are well up to expectations."


"From the second and subsequent litters will be selected animals to increase our own herd to a minimum of fifteen breeding sows and, of course, as replacements for sows leaving the herd. Others will be sold at the Pedigree Sales and by treaty and the remainder will be consumed on the Station or absorbed into the Bacon and Pork Industry. The greater part of our contribution to the consumer market will be provided by crossing our pedigree sows with a boar of the Large White breed, the result of this crossing (using good class animals) being an excellent bacon-type of pig."

"The herd is registered with the National Pig Breeders Association and selected the herd prefix of 'RADLOCK.' This has been formally approved by the Association. One gilt from the first litter of 'Chancellor's Spotlove 192nd has been selected and registered for inclusion in the herd. Radlock Spotlove 1st is now growing up, and very promising too."


