WELCOME

Welcome to the February 95 News Letter and the seventh that we have produced. Hopefully you will be receiving it in early March. In this issue we will be reporting on the January Committee Meeting at which preliminary arrangements were made for this year's AGM and the finalisation of details for the manufacture of the Apprentices Trophy which we intend to present to RAF Locking in June. The Committee hope that you all had an excellent Christmas and send best wishes for 1995. The latter is perhaps a little late since by the time you read this Easter will be rapidly approaching; this year it falls a little later. Good Friday to Easter Monday falling over the period 14th to 17th of April.

MEMBERSHIP NOTES

Membership has now reached 350 so we are well on the way to achieving the goal of 400 by the next AGM. This is the figure that we set ourselves last year. However, as we keep on saying, new member applications depend to a large extent on you spreading the word through the personal network. A membership application is enclosed for you to pass on to old friends.

We are enclosing a membership list with this issue and will be updating it in future Newsletters. The list is now too large to print in every issue; however, we are considering its inclusion in the proposed Members Handbook and this subject is still being discussed.

The reasons for not providing members' addresses are still valid and we will continue to maintain the policy. New members will no doubt be interested as to why we take this line. The reasons are, firstly, if we publish our database information we have to register the Association under the Data Protection Act at a quite large initial cost. Secondly, some members may wish their addresses to remain private and this desire must be given due regard. Lastly, for those members still serving, security considerations still apply despite the easing of tension with the PIRA cease-fire. And it is for this last reason that we do not include members' ranks on the database. Again, this policy was discussed at January's Committee Meeting where it was agreed that no changes would be implemented yet.

Should any member wish to contact another, we will be pleased to act as a post box and pass on any communication.

On a final sad note, we report the death of Sandra Crowe the wife of Committee Member Peter Crowe. Sandra died suddenly in early December and on behalf of all members of the Association we offer Peter our sincere condolences on his loss.

STANDING ORDER PAYMENT SYSTEM

Some members have yet to pay their renewal subscriptions and the Treasurer would like to remind you to honour the invoices sent out earlier. To make things easier he has arranged for the bank to collect dues by standing order and this is enlarged upon below.

Many of you in fact have asked if they can pay subscriptions by direct debit or standing order so that they can remove themselves from the onerous task of remembering to cough up. Well, direct debiting is not possible but standing orders are and since it does not cost the Association to implement such a system we have decided to go ahead. You will find enclosed a standing order form which should be returned to the Treasurer - he will then know that you are intending to pay this way before he advises your bank. You can then forget all about it. Unfortunately, subscriptions are set by the AGM and can therefore alter so for each change you will have to fill in a new proforma. However, this procedure should be minimal.

NINTH COMMITTEE MEETING

Once again the main item discussed at the ninth Committee Meeting held in January was the proposed RAF Locking Apprentice Trophy. We intend to present it to No 1 Radio School as a memorial to the training of Apprentices at the Unit from 1952 until 1976, a period of time just about equal in length to that of Apprentice training at Cranwell.

At last year's AGM, members voted a sum of £250 to provide a permanent trophy and, in addition, an annual sum of up to £50 to provide the person awarded the trophy with a personal prize. The design for the trophy has now being firmed up and the front elevation is illustrated on the attached sheet. The base unit and circular feature are to be manufactured

in mahogany with motifs and lettering in brass. It will stand approximately 12 inches high and the base will have a similar proportion. The back of the trophy will display a transistor symbol and sinewave and lettering will state simply "For Excellence."

It is being manufactured by Mr John Coombs, a former civilian higher instructional officer at RAF Locking. John was, for some years, the 4(T) Block Supervisor and is one of Weston's leading model and clock makers.

96TH ENTRY REUNION CHARITY COLLECTION

At a small ceremony at RAF Locking just before Christmas, Dave Calvert, on behalf of the 96th Entry, handed over a cheque for £175 to the Charity "Make a Wish." The money had been raised at the 96th Reunion held at Locking last October when attending members raised this splendid sum.

PRESENTATION OF "RAF APPRENTICES" VIDEO TO MR ALAN LANE

Before the start of the January Committee Meeting, our Chairman, Joe Holroyd, presented Mr Alan Lane with a copy of the "RAF Apprentices" video in recognition of his service to the Association. It was Mr Lane who had fortuitously been present in 4(T) Block when the old tech cinema was being stripped out and came across some odd pieces of celluloid film in a dustbin which, on examination, showed scenes of airmen on parade. After collecting the bits together he examined them more closely and discovered that it was film of apprentices taken by apprentices at both Cranwell and Locking in the early 50s.

SECOND AGM

Preliminary discussions took place on the subject of this year's AGM our second full one. Now the pattern is set we shall, as usual, be taking over 3(T) Block and the Station Theatre for the event and a full programme is being planned for the weekend of the 17/18 June. Events that new members can look forward to include a meet and greet reunion before the AGM, a visit to Flowerdown Fair, the Station's annual open day, followed by a dinner dance in the evening. There will be an informal rendezvous on the previous evening and for those members making an extended weekend there will be a recommended Sunday meeting place for lunch before members set off home. Since the next Newsletter will not be until May the provisional programme is enclosed now including a proforma for members who wish to book for the Dinner Dance.

FLOWERDOWN FAIR 95

Details are emerging about this year's FF95. The programme includes, of course, an air show, a small fair ground, helicopter flights, many stalls and an arena display. Great Weston Radio will also be running a live show from the arena. So far we do not know which aircraft have been allocated to the flying

display but we are assured that it will be at least as spectacular as last year's. The event will commence at around 10am on the morning of the AGM which is the 17 June 95 and the flying display will begin at 2pm. The event will close at about 5pm.

AUTUMN DINNER DANCE

Members will be glad to know that we will be holding a dinner dance this Autumn at Dance and Partyscene in Weston. This year it will be held on Saturday the 21 October. In the last Newsletter we invited alternative suggestions for venues but, so far, we have not heard from you. If there is anyone out there who would like to see a social event held elsewhere we should be pleased to hear from you.

MEMBER'S VIDEOS

We reported in the August Newsletter that Barry Price (85th) had a colour film of his entry pass out and asked if any other members have similar film that might be used in a future video. So far only George Gooch (72nd) has responded. The Association would be very interested to hear from other members if they have any old bits of celluloid film around.

Meanwhile we still have copies of our own video available at £6 plus post and packing. For the newer members who have not had an opportunity to see it the video features scenes from the 1950s at both Cranwell and Locking. The video includes a passing out parade and an AOC's parade at Cranwell; a Battle of Britain Church parade in Sleaford. At Locking you can see a sports day and an open day featuring a flying programme of contemporary aircraft. A proforma is enclosed should you wish to order one.

A MYSTERY

An interesting piece of information came our way this week about the Rt Rev Ted Cannan one time Bishop of Ascension Island and Assistant Bishop of Hereford shortly before his retirement. Ted, who died some 3 years ago, was an ex-Cranwell apprentice of the 35th Entry. After leaving the RAF in the early 50s he was ordained and re-entered the Service in 1953. He served as padre on many training units and, after finally leaving the RAF, was appointed a bishop. Now we learn that his pastoral staff was made at RAF Locking, reputedly by apprentices. So far we have not found out if Ted served at Locking although it seems highly likely but how apprentices became involved in the manufacture of this ecclesiastical badge of office is something of a mystery. Perhaps there is a member who can throw some light on the story. The staff, by the way, is to be presented to the RAF Museum by Ted's widow.

A LETTER TO THE EDITOR

When I read in the last Newsletter, that you were still asking for contributions, I was reminded of a conversation between the Curator of the RAF Museum and Roger Fendlay (who is one of the front men in the formation of a Boy Entrant Association).

The Curator, while discussing the exhibition of the Boys' Service at the Museum, said that it was quite a small display because of the lack of material. Lack of material? The scheme had only been in existence for 70 years! But I suppose that is not a long time. I had

the pleasure myself of serving with 2 ex-Flowerdown apprentices on Gozo in the early 1960s which meant that they had joined before 1929. And most of our artifacts we have either dumped or wasted unlike the Army who have always managed to hang on to their junk which, over the passage of time, has achieved great value. Well, despite this we still have memories and pen and paper. Of course whilst we don't have the pre-war or WWII experience of the contributors to the Cranwell and Halton magazines, there must be many members with a tale to tell. Do I hear cat-calls reverberating down the long corridors of the old spider blocks?

At an excellent Meet and Greet before the AGM last June, Alan Kime (67th) related what the Reviewing Officer said to him as they set off on the passing out parade inspection that suddenly made him human in those dark, austere days when air officers were a race apart. And Derek Hitchins (70th) told of an amusing incident when he found himself sitting next to his flight commander at a Colston Hall concert. So what? Well, in those days to be in Bristol at all was a hanging offence. The resulting action lost Derek his apprentice rank and upset the entry's passing out arrangements which took place a week or so later. It certainly would not have been amusing at the time.

Earlier this year I had a shock when I realised that it was 25 years since the investiture of the Prince of Wales. Then without a grey hair on my head, I was a member of the crack 50th Tac Comms Wing (I quote from Time or was it Newsweek description of us when reporting on the RAF's move into Zambia shortly after Rhodesia declared UDI) who was detached to Caemarvon Castle to set up a ground air comms link for the Investiture flypast.

As we stood inside the Castle, bemedalled in best bib and tucker, waiting for the festivities to start, I saw Tricia Nixon, the daughter of President Nixon approaching. I thought she was going to speak to the Constable of the Castle (Lord Snowdon) who was resplendent in his own bottle green designer uniform. Tricia didn't; she spoke to me. She asked me where the toilets were. That brief enquiry made my day.

My photograph appeared in the centre fold of the Sunday Times colour supplement standing behind the Queen, and the Duke of Edinburgh. And best of all the photograph subsequently appeared in the Country Life magazine!

I'm sure some of the "Black Catters" out there can top that. So lets be hearing from you. Who knows, Charles Hart may get that editor's warm feeling which comes with material on file.
